A detectable heartbeat

The Governor's heartbeat bill. This legislation prohibits a person from intentionally performing or inducing an abortion on a pregnant woman if the physician determines, in good faith and judgment, that the unborn fetus has a detectable heartbeat.

Not all resolutions are for the good. HJR0741 | Representative Weaver

Statement of Intent: affirms the constitutional duty and exclusive authority and power

of the General Assembly to appropriate public money and balance the state budget.

The resolution is aimed at Governor Lee's statement that TN welcomes refugees. Those who voted for the bill don't want refugees to settle in TN.

This statement doesn't change the law; it's just making a statement—and not a good

The resolution passed the House and is heading to the Senate Judiciary Committee for a hearing.
