The fight isn't over.



Here's the skinny on Medicaid and the Block Grant.

MEDICAID is a health care program that assists LOW-income families and individuals in paying for doctor visits, hospital stays, long-term medical, custodial care costs, and more. THIS IS VITAL in rural areas.

MEDICAID is a joint program, mostly funded by the federal

government and run at the state level, where coverage may vary.

MEDICAID in Tennessee is called TENNCARE and covers 1.4 million people: 50% of TN's CHILDREN and 60% TN's ELDERLY in nursing homes.

TENNCARE's expense is MOSTLY covered by the Federal

Government—2/3 of it. Tennessee's 1/3 is 20% of our state budget.

The TN Legislature passed Bill HB1280/SB1428 that asks for a Medicaid Block Grant instead of Expanding Medicaid. THAT MEANS Federal Funding for TennCare will be turned into a

Block Grant...

and THAT MEANS:

- TN HAS LOST and will continue to lose \$1.4 billion a year in federal healthcare funding · NO affordable coverage to uninsured families.
- NO funding struggling rural hospital
- NO Federal Regulations to ensure program integrity and accountability
- NO Federal Regulations to protect patients from shoddy
- treatment/discrimination by state or HMOs. A POWERFUL INCENTIVE now exists to cut on patient care and divert TennCare "savings" into other parts of the state budget.

But, the fight isn't over.

TNCPPC Opposed this bill. The bill passed.

There is overwhelming opposition to the Block Grant in TN. During a Public Comment Period, only one out of the many who attended five public hearings across TN spoke in favor of the Block Grant—AND, only 10 of 1,650

written responses were for it.
